SUMMARY:

Meeting Opening, Welcome and Introductions:

Chair Liz Peterson opened the meeting and asked for introductions. Mr. John Amodio was thanked for his dedication to YSS serving as the collaborative's Sacramento liaison.

2024 Year in Review:

Mr. Ben Campbell from Tuolumne River Trust, and Ms. Caitlin Henry from Tuolumne County, provided a presentation. Mr. Campbell said much work was done in preparation for implementation. The presentation is available here: MSA Accomplishments 2024

2025 Forestry Challenge Championship:

Ms. Diana Dealy Neill provided a presentation. She began by describing the purpose of Forestry Challenge. She said the goals of Forestry Challenge are to use skills in the field, interact with resource professionals, and provide an opportunity for diverse groups to enjoy the forest. 576 students participated in the fall of 2024. They utilized 200 volunteers. Thirty teams qualified to participate in the championship which is held at Pinecrest. MSA Video:

Ms. Henry said the county enlisted professionals to create a video about the MSA to increase public awareness. Today a teaser clip was shown. A full 20-minute video is being worked on and has more information about YSS than the teaser.

Pine Mountain Lake Fuels Reduction Project:

Ms. Lindsay Mattos from the Tuolumne County Resource Conservation District spoke about this project. The project stretches from the airport to Highway 120. It was designed to connect existing fuel work and covers approximately 700 acres. Treatment should be completed in 2026. The property belongs to the Mother Lode Land Trust. The goal is to bring back cattle to keep vegetation down. The project was funded by Cal FIRE.

USFS Updates:

Mr. Brian McCory spoke about SERAL 1.0. He said in 2024 5,000+ acres of mechanical work and 4,000 acres of prescribed fire were completed on the landscape. The G-Z project is on either side of Beardsley Reservoir and is underway. Bumblebee and Punch Bowl projects are going out to bid this year. The forest has additional federal funding coming.

SERAL 2.0 has two decisions signed. The first decision is for fuelbreaks, thinning, and prescribed fire. SERAL 2.0 along with SERAL 1.0 encompasses the entire Wildfire Landscape Strategy area. Project implementation within the first Record of Decision (ROD) should start in about 9 months. They are gaining capacity through the partnership with Tuolumne County and Tuolumne River Trust.

A relatively new company called Burnbot will do work within the 30,000-acre G-Z project. Burnbot uses innovative technology to implement projects. The company is centered in Silicon Valley.

The Hazard Tree Management Project is designed to address level 3, 4, and 5 roads and high use level 2 roads and recreation areas. The FS should sign the decision in the next couple of weeks. This will replace the piecemeal way of addressing hazard trees.

The Mountain Biking Project will encompass a review of approximately 300 miles of non-motorized trails in the Forest. The Forest will be designating mountain biking and e-bike trails and analyzing about 200 miles of unauthorized trails to consider whether to approve the trail or to modify, re-route, or close each trail. They will be designating motorized trails for e-bike use. They also will include signage and education. About 50 miles of rapid assessments have been completed. They are working with IMBA (International Mountain Bike Association).

Sacramento Update:

John Amodio presented lessons learned by YSS in Sacramento at the request of the Sierra Nevada Conservancy (SNC) and the governor's office. This will be put into publication. The focal point is to implement desired acreage sustained funding is imperative rather than up and down funding. He took the lessons learned to Senator John Laird who created the SNC. They took the ideas to a group of 15 people who are top in the state. This group was able to identify six different possible revenue streams. However, none are politically feasible currently. Some of these leaders are beginning a public awareness campaign. The Resources Legacy Fund hired two experts to do a deeper dive. They have completed their studies. Mr. Amodio concluded by stating if Sacramento is serious about reducing health risks and the safety of property and life, much more money must be invested.
