

Yosemite Stanislaus Solutions Collaborative General Membership Meeting Summary March 21, 2025 Forest Supervisor's Conference Rooms

SUMMARY:

Meeting Opening, Welcome and Introductions:

Chair Liz Peterson opened the meeting and asked for introductions. New member, Tuolumne Biomass, was welcomed.

Projects Update:

Mr. Ben Campbell reported on behalf of Tuolumne River Trust. Because Tuolumne County has provided financial backup, no work has halted because of measures taken by the Administration. SERAL 1.0 Phase 3, part 1 and 2, fuelbreak and fuel reduction work will continue. There are no wood products in Phase 3. The same treatment will take place on federal land and across private lands. Generally, road restoration is done to restore roads to the same shape as prior to the project but they can do a little extra like smooth out ruts, for example. They will be doing surveys in SERAL 2.0 (botanical, archeological and land line). It costs approximately \$50,000 per mile to do land line surveys. There is a shortage nationally of land surveyors. Gaining access is an intense process and they must do vegetation clearance of 3 feet from boundaries. Some boundaries have not been updated since the 1800s. They try to minimize how many land boundary surveys are done through flagging in response to agreements with landowners. Supervisor Jason Kuiken said he doesn't know of any other forest working across boundaries with SPI and private landowners at this scale. Tuolumne County has a single contractor for botanical surveys, and they have made improvements in the botanical survey systems. Marble, North Fork and Westside contracts are in place.

Rim Reforestation will continue. In the Rim footprint there is mosaic planting of around 1,900 acres to plant this year and next. TRT is taking on some of what the Groveland District had planned as the freeze on contracts will affect the USFS's ability to contract and would result in seedling death. They are shifting contracts from temporary employees to the MSA because of the hiring freeze. Half a million seedlings were delivered. Site prep has been slowed because of weather conditions. They will be planting over the next six weeks and then will do release treatments, hand and herbicide. There will be about 7,000-11,000 NEPA approved acres remaining after this planting. Ideally, they should do another round of assessments on the

remaining acres to document what acres and units are actually feasible vs those that are not feasible because they are too steep, rocky, have poor access, etc.

They are moving from encountering problems to anticipating problems. There are some archeological sites that do not have to be protected but can be shown to not to be heritage sites.

They are utilizing an app that allows the USFS to track the progress of projects which makes approval easier and faster. TRT is 95% responsible for contracting maps, which is a cartographic lift. The county received an SNC grant and hired a team to ground proof the data. Mr. Michael Jow suggested adding a time stamp to photos periodically.

2025 Forestry Challenge Focus Topic:

Ms. Diana Dealey Neill provided a presentation. The Championship Event is in the spring on the Stanislaus Forest. There will be about 115 students, and it is scheduled for April 23-25, Wednesday evening through Friday. The topic is, "What to do with Everything Except the Saw Logs." There will also be tours at Ultrapower, Heartwood, and SPI. They are also working with Crook Logging for part of the event. The main question for the students will be, "Do we treat on site or move it somewhere?" They need about 30 volunteers to judge on April 25th. OHV Planning Request:

Mr. Jeb Brooks said he is interested in how to incorporate OHV trail maintenance with fuels management in a grant application. His goal is to increase recreation on the forest. There is also a large demand for mountain biking trails. Supervisor Kuiken said they are trying to utilize existing roads. SNC has recreation funding going out this year looking at co-benefit projects. Mr. Brooks said he will volunteer to help with mapping. Chair Peterson asked Mr. Brooks to send grant opportunities to Mr. Sean Hembre and Ms. Caitlin Henry. This year there will be 11-12 operations going on with fuel reduction, timber harvest, and follow-up mastication.

USFS Updates:

SERAL 1.0 and 2.0 are moving along. Bumble Bee and Punch Bowl timber contracts are in the works. There are areas planned for burning. The Westside fuel reduction project is planned around Tuolumne City and Cottonwood Road. It is currently unfunded for implementation, but an application is in for funding. The G-Z project layout for Dry Meadow and Sour Grass has been done so it will be incorporated into the contract. Road reconstruction design must take place before timber sales.

Transportation grants were awarded to Heartwood, Ultra Power, and Burnbot but are on hold by the Administration.

Yesterday the 3rd Record of Decision (ROD-3) was released, and the objection period is open. This includes 7,500 acres of fuelbreak maintenance with herbicide. You can find more information here: ROD-3 The FS wants fire to be the primary tool, then mastication, then hand treatment, and lastly herbicide. The FS dropped targeted grazing. May 5th the objection period ends.

The SPI fuelbreak project was awarded recently. There is some money for initial fuelbreak implementation and maintenance. There is a national contract for lands that are adjacent to infrastructure and private property. On the Stanislaus Forest there is a proposal for 7,200 acres. Some acres are where there is already a decision in SERAL 2.0 and some are on the Calaveras District. These fuelbreaks will connect to fuelbreaks on SPI property. Money is for forest service lands only. This will amount to about 20 miles of fuelbreaks.

Mr. Curtis Kvamme provided an updated presentation on the restoration of Ackerson Meadow. They were helped by about 2,900 hours of volunteer work. They restored 200 acres of wetlands and created about 13 acres of habitat for the Western Pond Turtle. They will do the next round of erosion control planting this spring. Yosemite National Park will do long-term monitoring and write up the papers on the project. You can find the presentation here: Final Ackerson Meadow Presentation 25-3
